## Earth Day a daily commitment for Pacifica man

 ${\sf PACIFICA-Nearly\ every\ day\ is\ Earth\ Day\ for\ lan\ Butler\ and\ his\ "secret\ waterfall"-a\ cliffside\ stormwater\ outfall\ and\ before the property of the property$ pipe that spews litter into the ocean and along a beach Butler cleans up most days of the week.

"It's death by a thousand cuts," Butler, 49, said of the debris. "It's all the drains in Daly City and Pacifica, and every time it rains a few pieces of litter get sucked in."

The first time Butler saw the secret waterfall, which spills from a cliff well off the beaten track at the westernmost border between Daly City and Pacifica, the beach was covered in piles of plastic and muck several feet deep. Frogs were jumping over the trash.

It took Butler and a group of friends two weeks to clean it all up. And the next time it rained, the beach was again covered in plastic bags, bottles, Styrofoam, junk food wrappers and cigarette butts.

"I thought, either I give up or keep going," Butler recalled. "And now it's like I've adopted this puppy, and I can't let it go. I'm committed forever.

Butler's story exemplifies both the spirit of Earth Day and its limitations. As residents across San Mateo County gather for their own volunteer projects to commemorate the 40th anniversary of Earth Day, it's clear that the work to be done far exceeds the one day a year officially devoted to efforts such as trash pickup and removal of invasive plants — or two days a year, counting Coastal Cleanup Day.

The Pacifica Beach Coalition hopes to make the most of the time by involving every Pacifica resident in a planned cleanup of six beaches, 10 streets and nearly every school in the city on Saturday, April 24, two days after Earth Day's official observance.

Other cities are planning events for this weekend, including Redwood City's Earth Day on the Bay at the Marine Science Institute this Saturday.

Earth Day may come only once a year, but it's the best way to get kids into the habit of taking responsibility for their own consumption, said Lynn Adams, president of the Pacifica Beach Coalition.

Adams, 50, remembers the first Earth Day 40 years ago.

"I was 10 years old, and my mother said, 'OK, you guys, here's some gunny sacks. You need to go clean the street." We'd never done it before, but we did it every Earth Day since," she said.

Butler himself never celebrated Earth Day until two years ago, after he got involved in cleaning up the beach next to

"First you have to get people going form zero days (a year) to one," he said. "Hopefully, when people do a few of those cleanups, they start to see the litter — at first you can walk by and not see it. Now I go everywhere and I see it.
